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Preface

We have written *Time With God* because we know the immense power of God's Word to bring hope, encouragement, wisdom and guidance to those who are disciples of Jesus Christ and who strive to live godly lives.

We know, too, that it can be especially difficult for Christians to remain strong in their faith, and grow in their faith, while in prison. They may feel particularly isolated, being cut off from their church family, including perhaps those who have mentored them, as well as being separated from their own family. And those who become Christians in prison, or recommit their lives to Christ in prison, may not have any believers outside to offer support and encouragement.

We trust that *Time With God* will provide a measure of help as you face all the challenges of living a Christlike life in what is widely recognised as a dark place. As you live for Christ, you can be sure that there will be some around you who will be attracted to the One who is the Light of the World.

However it is important to study the Bible itself to learn how God wants us to live. *Time With God* is only intended to be a supplement to that basic diet of systematic reading and studying. We encourage you to make that part of your daily routine, ideally using published notes by recognised Bible teachers.

It is our prayer that, as you live as a disciple of Jesus in prison and upon release, the Lord will comfort, strengthen and sustain you

and nourish you by His Word. And as He does so, you can be confident that He will use you to bless and encourage others.

We hope that this book will also find its way into the hands of those who are not yet true followers of Jesus. If you are in that position, or if you are not sure what it really means to be a follower of Jesus, please read The Narrow Way with Jesus (page 36). Many people have false ideas about how we become a part of God's family: it is vitally important to understand what the Bible actually teaches.

Wherever you are on your journey of faith or if you have yet to begin the journey, we trust that *Time With God* will be a great help and encouragement to you.

Introduction

It is through the Bible that God has revealed Himself to us and shown us how we can get right with Him. And it is an instruction book for life for His children. It is a lamp for our feet, a light on our path.¹

But sometimes we read the Bible only as a duty, expecting to gain God's approval: read and tick – done! Sometimes we just search out promises which will make us feel better. But the real, life-changing, blessing comes when we use God's Word as He intended: to be read, to be noted and to be acted upon.

The Apostle James tells us that we deceive ourselves if we read the Bible without then acting upon it. His instruction is very clear: we must do what it says.

> Do not merely listen to the word, and so deceive yourselves. Do what it says.

> > James 1:22

James then likens the Bible to a mirror (in verses 23-24). Before leaving the house, we will look in the mirror to check that we are not going to embarrass ourselves with toothpaste around our mouth or with our hair being a complete mess.

The point is made that it is foolish to look in the mirror but then ignore the surplus toothpaste or the hair that needs combing.

Similarly, looking in the Bible is of little value if we do no more than simply read it.

As you use *Time With God*, ask God to speak to you through His Word and expect Him to do so. You may be comforted; you may be challenged; you may receive a word of assurance; you may be rebuked; you may be given a clear instruction to act.

So pray, read, note and then pray again in response to what you have read. For some of the days, we have suggested short prayers: use them if they are appropriate for you. And then act on what you have received from the reading.

For day seven of each week, there are verses from a psalm of praise to help you to worship God. As you do so, thank God for His specific blessings to you.

On that day you will also be encouraged to pray for your prison: a few specific areas of need are suggested. Please don't think that you cannot pray for your prison on any other day!

Finally, a suggestion: is there another Christian with whom you can meet to work through the readings together? You could meet once a week, but ideally more frequently, to share what you have each gained from the readings – and to pray for each other. Meeting with our brothers and sisters in Christ is so vital to our wellbeing as Christians – and makes us stronger to withstand Satan's attacks.

On Eagles' Wings

...but they who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings like eagles; they shall run and not be weary; they shall walk and not faint.

We usually think of strength in physical terms but we also need strength of character and moral courage. We need to be strong in faith and in resolve.

However, life's journey is long and often hard and even the strongest grow weak.

This wonderful verse reassures us. Tiredness is natural for us, but God is never weary. We all feel weak at times: God is almighty and all powerful and His strength and His might never diminish. We can feel weakened by

disappointment, and discouraged by failure. We get tired of life and its pressures and anxieties and sadness.

But when we wait on Him everything changes. The word 'wait' used here means to wait expectantly and in hope: to kneel before Him with our hands outstretched knowing that we will receive. We trust Him to restore, refresh and renew us.

This 'waiting' is not like waiting for a bus: a kind of wishful thinking! This is about waiting in His presence, in a place and attitude of prayer with certain hope and with complete trust.

Our Father's timing is never wrong. And so, in His time, like an athlete running a marathon or a long distance hiker striding towards their destination, our strength too will be renewed. So, let us learn to wait, in expectant prayer and unwavering trust, in the presence of the One who does not slumber or sleep. And in due time He will raise us up and you and I shall 'soar on wings like eagles'!

The Pain of Loss

The LORD is close to the broken-hearted and saves those who are crushed in spirit.

Psalm 34:18

All loss is extremely painful and very hard to bear. And it is not just freedom that is lost when a prison sentence is handed down. There may also be the loss of contact with families and friends; the loss of careers, possessions and homes; and the loss of reputation, dignity and respect.

But we have a Saviour who understands the depth and the sorrow of the loss that you feel, more than you will ever know. When He came, He lost heaven and the worship of angels. He lived in poverty and He was homeless.

And worst of all, having lived and loved, healed, helped and taught all those who came to Him, He was arrested. The charge was false. His enemies stirred up the crowd until they were all baying for His blood. His friends deserted Him, the soldiers mocked and flogged Him, then stripped Him naked and nailed Him to the cross He had been forced to carry.

And at His dying, carrying the weight of our sin, even His Father could not look at Him. And then He died, having lost everything.

So when the pain of your loss weighs you down, you know that you can bring it to a Saviour who endured pain and loss Himself.

He is close to the brokenhearted, and He will hold you as you grieve.

Spurring and **Encouraging**

And let us consider how we may spur one another on towards love and good deeds, not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another – and all the more as you see the Day approaching.

Hebrews 10:24-25

Some people say that you can be a Christian without having to go to church. And that is true. You are saved through faith in Christ alone and you do not have to meet with other believers to keep your salvation. But it is very foolish and dangerous to think that you can live effectively as a Christian on your own.

Life is tough. Life is even tougher for those who are determined to live to please God. They are up against Satan, the most cunning of enemies. And he knows that Christians will not grow in their faith, as God desires, when they

are isolated from other believers. Rather they are more vulnerable to Satan's lies and attacks and will become weak and ineffective.

The writer to the Hebrews knows that too. He urges believers to spur one another on and encourage each other on their journey. And the best way of encouraging each other as members of God's family is through meeting together.

Meeting together should not be limited to the weekly chapel services if there are midweek Bible study groups you can

attend. And perhaps there may be other Christians on your landing with whom you can meet. You will be strengthened as you pray for each other and share from God's Word, as you look forward to the Day when Jesus will return. And are you an encourager? It is something which we can all do as we look out for one another and get alongside those who are struggling, in order to spur them on.

Father God, please help me to make it a priority to meet with other believers, both for their benefit and mine. Please help us all to encourage each other during our time together in prison.

Going Wrong

You have searched me, LORD,

The Sat-Nav is a great invention. We enter our destination and set off. From somewhere above us an unseen satellite identifies our car and the route that we need to take. A voice guides us on our journey and as we arrive announces: 'You have reached your destination!' It's great technology!

But enter the wrong destination or ignore the instructions, and we finish up in the wrong place. If we should start to go the wrong way, our guide prompts us: 'Turn around where possible'. Sadly, we are not always obedient.

In life, we all take wrong turnings, suffer the consequences and finish up in the wrong place. For some, that wrong place is prison.

Today's verses remind us that there is never a moment when God does not see us. He is not some impartial satellite in the sky, or an intrusive surveillance camera. He is a loving Father protectively watching over His beloved child.

And yes, He does see our mistakes and failings, and is angry when we sin, but He does not turn His back on us. He sees our remorse, hears our

confession and knows our repentant heart. And He forgives us because His precious Son died to take the punishment for our sins. He turns us around and puts us back on track.

Our destination is Glory and we need to travel well. So the Father watches over our journey as we follow in the footsteps of Jesus, and the Holy Spirit is our guide to bring us safely home.

Heavenly Father, I am sorry for those many times when I have deliberately chosen to ignore Your warnings. Thank You for not abandoning me. Please help me whenever I am in danger of going wrong.

Temptation

Then he returned to his disciples and found them sleeping. 'Couldn't you men keep watch with me for one hour?' he asked Peter. 'Watch and pray so that you will not fall into temptation. The spirit is willing, but the flesh is weak.'

Matthew 26:40-41

The disciples gave in to temptation and let Jesus down when He needed them most.

For Adam and Eve, temptation came disguised as a friendly serpent with a seemingly harmless question: *Did God really say...?*¹ They were persuaded and fell for the lie. And the innocence of the world that God made was destroyed for the rest of time.

We do not always recognise temptation for it usually comes with a mask. It strikes where our defence is weakest and often returns to the scene of its latest success. We may not recognise temptation the first time it beckons, but once we fall, it takes off the mask and draws us like a magnet.

When Jesus was about to start His ministry, which He knew would lead to the Cross, He was severely tempted by Satan. He was weak from hunger, but He did not give in. So it is not a sin to be tempted, as Jesus was. But it is a sin to sin, which Jesus resisted.

We can learn from Jesus. He countered every lie of Satan with the truth of Scripture² and so can we. The Bible is called the 'sword of the Spirit':³ it is a weapon in

our hands and we need to learn how to wield it.

And we need to be alert or temptation will overpower us.

Jesus was right when He said: *The*

spirit is willing, but the flesh is weak. So we must watch and pray, both before and when temptation comes or, just like His disciples, we will also let Jesus down.

Tempted and tried, I need a great Saviour, One who can help my burdens to bear; I must tell Jesus, I must tell Jesus; He all my cares and sorrows will share.

O how the world to evil allures me!

We need to master gratitude. In our minds, the bad things in life, the wrongs and the disappointments always seem to crowd out the good things. We may give passing thanks but that is not the same as having an 'attitude of gratitude.'

A thankful heart blesses us and blesses others. David addressed the first verse of this wonderful psalm to his own soul. He is saying: let the whole of my being celebrate the goodness of the Holy God: in everything I do and say and think and remember, let me pour out praise and blessing to Him who made me, loves me and saves me.

Praise and gratitude for all that God has done and won for us,

will fill our lives with light. Make praise your habit.

We come into this world with nothing and when we die, we leave behind every possession we ever had. But we also leave the legacy of the lives we have blessed along the way. The believer, whose heart is full of praise for their Maker, leaves this sad world a much better place.

A Challenge

Are you up for a challenge? Psalm 103 is a great psalm to memorise. Why not try to commit as much of it to memory as you can?

Worship Him: He Is Our Redeemer

Praise the LORD, my soul, and forget not all his benefits who forgives all your sins and heals all your diseases, who redeems your life from the pit and crowns you with love and compassion, who satisfies your desires with good things so that your youth is renewed like the eagle's.

> The LORD works righteousness and justice for all the oppressed.



Slow to **Anger**

My dear brothers and sisters, take note of this: everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to become angry, because human anger does not produce the righteousness that God desires.

James 1:19-20

Keep calm and count to ten. That, essentially, is what James is instructing Christians to do when they get angry; they are to be slow to speak and slow to show their anger. They may need to count to ten very slowly!

Anger is a natural emotion and we cannot stop ourselves from being angry; for example, if we are treated unfairly or not treated with respect or if untrue things are said about us. But we must exercise great care in the way we handle our anger.

Elsewhere in his letter, James warns of the damage the tongue can do when it is not controlled. He likens it to a fire which can cause great devastation.1 And we are in great danger if we fail to heed the advice of James to be slow to speak. Relationships can be soured, or even destroyed, within seconds.

Another major cause of anger is frustration, an inevitable feature of prison life. And with so many men and women in prison because of their uncontrolled

anger, it is hardly surprising that all who live and work in prison encounter outbursts of anger.

By striving to be slow to anger, we show the righteousness that God desires, for we know that He Himself is 'slow to anger and rich in love.'2

When you heed this advice of James, you can be sure that it will be noticed, perhaps opening up opportunities to explain that it comes from having the righteousness of Christ.

A Prayer

Dear Lord, I am sorry for the times when I have failed to control my anger. Please forgive me. And please help me to follow the advice of the Apostle James, for I want people to see that Christ lives in me.

When the Wicked Prosper

When my heart was grieved and my spirit embittered, I was senseless and ignorant; I was a brute beast before you.

Yet I am always with you; you hold me by my right hand. You guide me with your counsel, and afterwards you will take me into glory. Whom have I in heaven but you? And earth has nothing I desire besides you. My flesh and my heart may fail, but God is the strength of my heart and my portion for ever.

Those who are far from you will perish; you destroy all who are unfaithful to you. But as for me, it is good to be near God. I have made the Sovereign LORD my refuge; I will tell of all your deeds.

Psalm 73:21-28

In the first part of this psalm, Asaph (one of the musicians) complains that the wicked prosper and asks why God allows it. At times, he confesses, he has envied them and has seen little point in living a godly life.

But in verses 21-28, he admits that he was wrong to think like that and to complain. He has woken up to the fact that he needs to be thankful to God who is always with him; holds him by the hand; guides him with His

wisdom; strengthens him and is his refuge.

Asaph concludes that there is nothing the world has to offer that he really desires. And he remembers that the wicked will perish but he - and all believers will be taken into Glory.

We can all be guilty of coveting what unbelievers have, especially when Satan tempts us along that path. Let us not envy them but, rather, let us show them compassion and pray for them.

Weakness and Confidence

For we do not have a high priest who is unable to feel sympathy for our weaknesses, but we have one who has been tempted in every way, just as we are – yet he did not sin. Let us then approach God's throne of grace with confidence, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help us in our time of need.

Hebrews 4:15-16

Without Jesus, we would not, and we could not, approach God. Without Jesus, the shame of our sins would keep us at a distance from God who is holy, pure and righteous.

But, wonderfully, Jesus is our great high priest. Having taken on humanity, He knows and understands all our weaknesses and, through Him, we can approach God the Father. Not

only do we have permission to approach Him but we are encouraged to do so boldly. And for what purpose? So that our most crucial needs are met: God's mercy and grace.

One of the many frustrations in prison can be the lengthy and slow process you have to follow to get an appointment to see someone. An application is submitted and you wait and

hope that a response will be forthcoming reasonably quickly. And you can often be disappointed by the delay.

But with the Almighty Creator God no appointment is needed!

We can approach Him at any time – and whatever our need. Why are we so slow and reluctant to take advantage of this immense privilege?

When Grown Men Cry

... He has risen! He is not here ... But go, tell his disciples and Peter,...

Mark 16:6b-7a

Jesus had last seen Peter when Peter denied that he even knew Jesus, let alone followed Him. At that moment, Jesus, under arrest and on His way to die, turned and looked directly at His friend. Peter, tough fisherman though he was, met that gaze and left the courtyard, sobbing.1

It gets worse. Peter had last seen Jesus when they took His dead body down from the cross, laid Him in a rock tomb and sealed the entrance with a great stone.

But this was not the end. Two days later, the stone has been rolled away. The tomb is empty and the women, who make the discovery, are told that Jesus is no longer there. He is alive again. He has risen from death, as He always said He would, and soon they will see Him again. Then comes the messenger's instruction to the women to 'tell His disciples and Peter.'

Why the special mention of Peter, who denied Him; the one who failed Him: the coward who deserted Him at the moment of His greatest need?

It was because Jesus knew Peter's heart. He understood the grief that his failure had cost him: his tears of shame and his remorse. And Jesus still had a wonderful purpose for Peter's life. He needed to know, more than the other disciples, that in Jesus' death and resurrection there was a new beginning; there was forgiveness and there was

restoration. His failure was not the end of his story after all.

These are wonderful, gracious, life-changing, heart-changing words. And they are not just for Peter. They are also for you - and for us all.

A Prayer

Father God, please forgive me for the times I have denied being one of Your followers or have chosen just to keep guiet. Please give me the courage to let others know that I love You and worship You.

Home for Eternity

But our citizenship is in heaven. And we eagerly await a Saviour from there, the Lord Jesus Christ,

Philippians 3:20

It is extremely sad to hear someone say that they feel at home in prison, perhaps because they have spent so much of their life inside or perhaps because it is where they feel most secure.

Those who follow Jesus should not even think of their own home as 'home' but, rather, look to heaven as their home – their eternal home. As the Apostle Paul reminds us, believers are citizens of heaven.

Elderly Christians are often heard to say, as they become frail, that they are 'ready to go home'. But we should be ready and eager to 'go home' at every stage of our lives, just as Paul was. Earlier in his letter to the Philippians, he wrote:

For to me, to live is Christ and to die is gain... Yet what shall I choose? I do not know! I am torn between the two: I desire to depart and be with Christ, which is better by far; but it is more necessary for you that I remain in the body.¹

Paul concluded that, despite his longing to be with Christ, the Lord still had work for him to do here on earth in supporting other believers.

You may be looking forward to leaving prison quite soon. Or that may be a long way off. But remember that your eternal

home is in heaven. Look forward to that and to the welcome you will receive from Jesus Himself, whenever that will be.

Thy Will Be Done

This is what the Sovereign LORD, the Holy One of Israel, says:

'In repentance and rest is your salvation,

When Isaiah wrote these words, the Israelite nation was about to be taken into captivity. It was a harsh but righteous judgment because it was the only way that God could save them from themselves and thereby save us.

God had chosen Abraham's descendants to be His people so that, in time, salvation could come to this broken world through them.

But, like the surrounding nations, His people had also become rebellious and obstinate and they needed to be moved back into His purpose and His will. Otherwise, the nations of earth would be lost.

There could have been salvation for them, but that salvation would only be in repentance and in rest. They could be strong, but strength would only come in quietness and trust of Him.

But they rejected God's ways.
Their wilful disobedience meant
that they were now destined for
70 years of captivity and
judgment.

We all have an obstinate streak.

We all go our own way and take comfort in our own sense of

rightness. We turn our back on God's will. Like the Israelites, we say: 'I will have none of it.'

To find rest and safety, we must repent of our obstinacy and surrender to His will for our life. And then, in quietness and trust, we will find strength.

In Gethsemane, although Jesus prayed to His Father that He might be spared the Cross, nevertheless He acknowledged that the Father's will had to be done. That must also be our prayer.

Take my will and make it thine; It shall be no longer mine. Take my heart it is thine own; It shall be thy royal throne.

The Narrow Way with Jesus

There are two ways to live: we can either live to please ourselves or live to please God who created us. We can either ignore God or be a part of His family, allowing Him to rule our lives.

Jesus Himself spoke of these two ways. One is entered by a wide gate and the other by a narrow gate.

We all start out life on the broad road. We are born with a sinful nature, inherited from Adam who disobeyed God in the Garden of Eden. And our sinful nature means that we rebel against God. God hates our sin and Jesus warns us that the broad road leads to destruction.

Those who choose the narrow way – and only a few do – have the promise that they will be safe with Jesus, in God's Kingdom, forever.

Jesus said:

Enter through the narrow gate. For wide is the gate and broad is the road that leads to destruction, and many enter through it.

But small is the gate and narrow the road that leads to life, and only a few find it.

Matthew 7:13-14

Jesus Himself is the narrow gate: He is the only means of access to the narrow road. Once safely through the gate, we follow Him along the narrow road that leads to His Father.

Jesus said:

I am the gate; whoever enters through me will be saved.

John 10:9a

I am the way and the truth and the life.

No one comes to the Father except through me.

John 14:6

Jesus left heaven and came to earth in order to save us from our sinful nature. He came to rescue everyone who wants to get off the broad road. He made it possible by giving up His life. When He was crucified, He paid the dreadful penalty for our sin.

God welcomes all who believe that Jesus died for them and who repent of their sin. He then forgives their sin and declares them to be righteous in His sight – made right with Him.

One day Jesus will return from heaven and everyone who has ever lived will have to stand before Him. Those who have travelled on the broad road – the unrighteous – will face God's wrath and will be condemned to everlasting punishment.

Those who have travelled the narrow way – who have received the righteousness of Jesus Christ – will be welcomed into His presence, safe forever.

The Bible tells us:

For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life.

... but whoever does not believe stands condemned already because they have not believed in the name of God's one and only Son.

John 3:16, 18b

And so we all have a choice to make. It is not, as some may think, a simple choice between enjoying this life and enjoying the next life. The narrow way will bring true fulfilment of purpose now, as well as securing the safety of heaven for eternity. And no one should treat lightly the warning that the broad road does lead to destruction.

Choosing the road we travel in life is the most crucial decision we face. If you are ready to commit to following Jesus on that narrow road, you can make that change now by praying this prayer.

Dear Father God,

I am very sorry for everything in my life that has not been right. I no longer want to live that way.


Thank You for sending Jesus to die in my place, for my sins, to rescue me from the broad road that leads to destruction.

Please forgive me and accept me as Your child. Please fill me with Your Holy Spirit to help me to follow Jesus on that narrow road and to make Him the centre of my life. Thank You.

Amen.

If you have prayed this prayer honestly and sincerely, God welcomes you into His family as His child. Tell someone of your decision – a chaplain or a friend who is a mature Christian – and ask them to help you to begin reading the Bible. Join a Bible study group if you can.

Most importantly, start meeting with others who are on the same journey, on the narrow road, that you have now started. You will be able to encourage each other in your life as a follower of Jesus.

He Is Risen

In their fright the women bowed down with their faces to the ground, but the men said to them, 'Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here; he has risen!...'

Luke 24:5-6a

The resurrection is at the very heart of the gospel: Jesus Christ, the sinless Son of the living God, surrendered His life to pay the penalty for our sins. Without the resurrection, the foundation of the gospel collapses.

There is overwhelming evidence that Jesus was raised from the dead. Knowing the unbelief of human nature, God has recorded for us the evidence of many witnesses. The Bible tells us that, on one occasion, more than five hundred people saw Jesus.¹

Had Jesus remained in the tomb, our sins would not have been paid for.² And there would be no guarantee that Jesus was able to overcome the devil who has the power of death.³

But Jesus' body did not remain in the tomb. The recorded evidence proves conclusively that Jesus did rise from the dead! And because He conquered death, all who are in Christ have been born again to a living hope. Death had no power over Him and has no power over those who have that living hope.

If you are not yet convinced that Jesus really did rise from the dead, why not meet with a Christian to share your doubts and look together at the evidence for the resurrection? At the same time, ask God for the gift of faith.

Low in the grave he lay, Jesus my Saviour, Waiting the coming day, Jesus my Lord!

Up from the grave he arose; with a mighty triumph o'er his foes; he arose a victor from the dark domain, and he lives forever, with his saints to reign. He arose! He arose! Hallelujah! Christ arose!

Sin: Its Pleasure and Its Pain

My wounds fester and are loathsome because of my sinful folly. I am bowed down and brought very low; all day long I go about mourning.

> I am feeble and utterly crushed; I groan in anguish of heart.

> > Psalm 38:5-6, 8

There is pleasure in sin. We would not be tempted to sin if there was no pleasure to be gained from it. But the pleasure of sin is followed by its pain. We are always quick to foresee the pleasure and slow to foresee the pain that will follow. The pleasure may be short-lived; the pain and the consequences may linger for years or even for a lifetime.

David is greatly distressed by a dreadful disease that God has inflicted upon him. There is the additional pain of seeing his friends desert him because of the disease. (v11).

But it is not only the physical pain which is distressing David. He is overwhelmed with guilt; he admits that he has been foolish and does not deny that he deserves God's discipline. At the same time, he pleads for God to show mercy:

LORD, do not rebuke me in your anger or discipline me in your wrath. (v1)

Let us never cease to give thanks to God for His mercy and grace to us. All who put their trust in Jesus are cleansed from the guilt of their sin.

But let us never forget the pain our sin causes, to others as well as ourselves. And let us never

forget the pain it causes God. He hates sin and we must resolve to hate it too.

Take away the love of sinning; Alpha and Omega be; End of faith, as its Beginning, Set our hearts at liberty.

Getting to the Root

Make every effort to live in peace with everyone and to be holy; without holiness no one will see the LORD.

See to it that no one falls short of the grace of God and that no bitter root grows up to cause trouble and defile many.

Hebrews 12: 14-15

We would not expect peace to require effort, but it does. To keep the peace can take a huge amount of self-control. There will always be people who annoy us, humiliate us or disagree with our point of view. Is it worth the effort to try to maintain the peace?

We are holy people, which means we are set apart for God: we are distinctive in our attitudes and in our daily lives. We are people of grace: saved by grace and kept by grace.

Anger and frustration will eventually make us bitter. But this verse instructs us not to allow bitterness an opportunity to take root. Once it becomes established, it will take us over. Bitterness and resentment in churches has discouraged believers, destroyed unity and mission and ultimately divided them.

We have to let bitterness go because, if unchecked, it will certainly 'cause trouble and will defile many'. 'Defile' means to stain or pollute. It is the opposite of holiness, and the damage we do by our bitterness will keep others from seeing Christ in us.

This is a spiritual battle and we are dependent on the Holy Spirit

if we are to know victory. He will work with us and in us and we, in turn, must work with Him. He will empower our efforts as we aim to live at peace with everyone, and to be holy. Sadly, if we hold on to our bitterness, the lost will never see Him at work in us.

A Prayer

Father God, I confess that I am guilty of being bitter towards (name the person(s)). I realise now that it is wrong to hold on to bitterness, even though I think I have been treated badly. Please help me to let go of it.

The Friend of God

And the scripture was fulfilled that says, 'Abraham believed God, and it was credited to him as righteousness,' and he was called God's friend.

James 2:23

Abraham was a remarkable man with a remarkable faith. His early years were spent in Ur, a city of the Babylonian empire. In the Bible, Babylon is a picture of worldliness: the place where you create your own gods and worship them.

When God told Abraham to leave Babylon, he obeyed without knowing where God was leading him. When he finally arrived in the land that God promised to his descendants, Abraham believed God and put up his tent, even though he had no descendants at that point. He never built a house; he never again lived in a city. He was not perfect, but he was obedient even when he didn't have all the answers. He trusted God completely.

Abraham lived in harmony with his Maker rather than putting his hope in the world. We are told:

For he was looking forward to the city with foundations, whose architect and builder is God.¹

Abraham kept his eyes on heaven, but his faith was practical. He did not just believe *in* God: He *believed God* and proved it by his unquestioning obedience.

Of all the men in the world at that time, God chose Abraham to be the father of the nation into which His precious Son would come to save mankind.

Because Abraham trusted God completely, God was able to

have complete trust in him. That is real friendship. Centuries later, Jesus told His disciples: *You are my friends if you do what I command.*²

That is a promise for us today. We are His friends when we trust and obey Him completely.

I've found a friend, O such a friend!
He bled, he died to save me;
And not alone the gift of life,
But His own self He gave me;
Naught that I have my own I call,
I hold it for the Giver;
My heart, my strength, my life, my all
Are His, and His forever.

Joy Comes with the Morning

Sing the praises of the LORD, you his faithful people; praise his holy name.

For his anger lasts only a moment, but his favour lasts a lifetime; weeping may stay for the night, but rejoicing comes in the morning.

Psalm 30:4-5

We'd like to be happy all the time but life isn't like that. For many in prison, the happy times are probably very few. And we all experience those dark times when we find ourselves crying into our pillows.

Some of the hardest things are those miserable situations that we owe to our own fault or folly. We are angry and disappointed with ourselves and have only ourselves to blame.

Other people may be angry with us as well, and worse, we have

disappointed Father God. His love for us is not diminished, but He is rightfully angry. There is no loneliness like it.

But these verses give us cause to sing. God's anger towards His children's failure and disobedience is measured and does not last forever. But His love does.

Our remorse and our tears are appropriate at the time and for a time. But His anger is soon lifted and we can see that His love has never left us. There is comfort here and, in time, that is what will enable us to move forward.

This psalm of King David, which comes out of his own painful experience and many years of sorrow, ends with the words:

You turned my wailing into dancing; you removed my

sackcloth and clothed me with joy, that my heart may sing your praises and not be silent. (v11-12a)

Don't lose heart. Despite everything, God's anger lasts only for a moment. His favour lasts a lifetime.

And this Lord is all our hope
Despite our weeping through the night,
That joy, deep joy
Comes with the morning
And floods our hearts with freedom
And with light.

How Blessed We Are

Blessed is the one whose transgressions are forgiven, whose sins are covered.

Psalm 32:1

Conversations in your prison about being blessed are only likely to be heard within the chapel. Many people think of 'blessed' as a religious word, as when a priest confers a blessing on someone.

But others think of it as 'anything that makes you happy', such as good health; a comfortable home; an expensive car; the birth of a healthy child; a lottery win; an unexpected ROTL or, perhaps, being found not guilty of a crime that was committed!

Although it is right to thank God for some of these at least, the

blessings mentioned in the Bible are quite different.

In this psalm, the writer recognises the joy – the blessing – which comes from knowing that God has forgiven our sins.

In other psalms we are told that we are blessed if we: delight in the law of the LORD;¹ take refuge in the LORD;² trust in the LORD;³ are disciplined and taught by the LORD.⁴

Jesus spoke of those who were blessed as including those who: hunger and thirst for righteousness; are pure in heart; are peacemakers; are insulted, persecuted and suffer false and evil accusations because of Him.⁵ (See Hated, Persecuted and Blessed, page 156)

How blessed we *are* as God's children, especially that our sins are forgiven and that we have an

inheritance that is being kept for us in heaven.⁶ And how blessed we *will be* when we receive that inheritance.

Think about how the Lord has blessed you and thank Him for His love and goodness to you.

O the deep, deep love of Jesus!
Love of ev'ry love the best:
'Tis an ocean vast of blessing,
'Tis a haven sweet of rest.
O the deep, deep love of Jesus!
'Tis a heav'n of heav'ns to me;
And it lifts me up to glory,

Mercy or Judgment

But the tax collector stood at a distance.

He would not even look up to heaven,
but beat his breast and said,
'God, have mercy on me a sinner.'

Luke 18:13

The meaning behind Jesus' parable about the Pharisee and the Tax Collector could not be clearer.¹ Pharisees were respected members of society: tax collectors were despised. Jesus contrasted their attitudes as they went to the temple to pray.

The Pharisee was full of his own righteousness: his prayer was all about himself as he thanked God that he was not like the tax collector. In contrast, the tax collector was just too ashamed even to look up to heaven. There was nothing he could say in his

favour. His prayer was a simple heartfelt cry for mercy.

Jesus tells us that the tax collector went home knowing that he was now right with God.

The Apostle Paul reminds us that God is rich in mercy:

But because of his great love for us, God, who is rich in mercy, made us alive with Christ even when we were dead in transgressions – it is by grace you have been saved.²

We all need God's mercy but He will only grant it to those who humbly ask for it.

Even in prison there are 'Pharisees'. They look down on others and judge them for their crimes, whilst refusing to acknowledge any need of God's mercy themselves. (Sadly, too, there are those who demonstrate no shame

but, rather, boast of their crimes.)

If you have received God's mercy, use this prayer to thank Him. (If you have never cried out to God for mercy, go to page 36 which explains how you can do so today.)

A Prayer

Father God, like the tax collector, I have no defence – apart from Jesus. Without Him, I would face your judgment. But having repented, I know that Jesus has taken my punishment upon Himself. Thank You for showing me mercy.

There are times when it can be helpful to give yourself a 'good talking to'! King David does that in this psalm. He wrote the psalm at a time when he felt threatened, perhaps when his son, Absalom, was conspiring against him. Whatever the situation, he was scared and was not certain whether he really could depend upon God to protect him.

In verse 5, David addresses himself, 'my soul', and reflects on the truth that there is no limit to God's power. As he does so, he begins to realise that God is well able to protect him. His confidence grows as he likens God to a fortress, a mighty rock and a refuge – and knows that God is his personal fortress and in Him he 'shall not be shaken'.

Having reached that point of absolute confidence in God's protection, David encourages his people to put their trust in God at all times.

In another of his psalms, David wrote that he had experienced God setting him free from his fears.

I sought the LORD, and he answered me; he delivered me from all my fears.¹

Do you have David's confidence, that you are able to address God as 'my fortress, my mighty rock and my refuge'? And are there Christians you know who need this encouragement at the present time? And are there unbelievers you know who would want to be told of the refuge that is available to them?

Heavenly Father, please forgive me for those times when I have doubted Your power to protect me and doubted Your care for me. Please help me to trust You whatever I have to face in the future.

A Beautiful Thing

'Leave her alone,' said Jesus. 'Why are you bothering her? She has done a beautiful thing to me...'

Mark 14:6

Those words of Jesus, 'She has done a beautiful thing to me,' would have remained with that woman for the rest of her life. The beautiful thing was the anointing of Jesus' head with the entire jar of a very expensive perfume.

To some of those present, that was a foolish thing: in their eyes, the money would have been better spent on providing for the poor. But the woman had only one desire – to express her love for Jesus. It was an extravagant act of devotion and Jesus commended her for it. She gave no thought to the cost. No one could put a price on what she did.

You will remember the words of Jesus, when He was teaching about showing kindness to those in need:

'... whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.'1

So, why not ask God to lead you to someone today for whom you can do a beautiful thing?

Do not expect applause from others who may think you have been wasteful. But take delight in knowing that Jesus will always take pleasure in the beautiful things you do in His name.

The *most* beautiful thing is to pour out your heart to Jesus in worship, holding nothing back. And remember, too, how Mary

was commended by Jesus for making the better choice, sitting at His feet to listen to what He had to say.²

Take my love; my Lord, I pour At thy feet its treasure store. Take myself, and I will be Ever, only, all for thee, Ever, only, all for thee.

Unconfined

He brought me out into a spacious place; he rescued me because he delighted in me.

Psalm 18:19

In prison, we lose our freedom. We are confined by walls and gates and bars. We are confined to a cell. We are confined by regimes, lock-ups and lock-downs and prison rules.

We may dream of freedom, but even on the outside there are restrictions and restraints. It is a part of life's structure. We have responsibilities and dependants. We are restricted by our working hours or our health limitations. But on the outside we accept the limitations of daily living more easily because we do have some freedom to choose.

Psalm 18 was written by David. His life had been wretched. Pursued by his enemies, he writes (in verses 4-5):

The cords of death entangled me; the torrents of destruction overwhelmed me. The cords of the grave coiled around me; the snares of death confronted me.

In his distress David calls to the Lord and his cry is heard. God sets him free from his enemies: he is no longer confined to the rocks and caves where he had hidden in fear of his life. Now he is truly free, standing in a spacious place: a wide place where there is no need to fear or hide.

Is it possible to stand in that spacious place even within the confines of a prison? Yes. The Bible tells us: So if the Son sets you free, you will be free indeed.

Your Heavenly Father has rescued you because He delights in you. You are confined by prison life, but your spirit, mind, heart and soul are liberated. They are unconfined, and He has brought you out to stand with Him, in that spacious place. The Son has set you free.

A Prayer

Almighty God, You know the pain that we all experience being confined to prison. But help those of us who know Jesus to rejoice that, despite our circumstances, He has set us free.

In Jesus' Name, Amen.

Shipwrecked

There is an old lighthouse built on the edge of a high cliff. One night two hundred years ago, there was a violent storm and a ship was driven towards the cliff and foundered on the rocks beneath the lighthouse.

The crew managed to scramble onto a ledge at the bottom of the cliff. Some were injured but the storm made any rescue attempt impossible. They huddled there in the dark, in the cold, soaked through, afraid and wretched.

The younger of the two lighthouse keepers offered to be lowered on a rope down to the men. It was a perilous descent but it was his compassion for their plight that drove him.

That did not change their situation: the storm still raged but the lighthouse keeper brought light and hope. He stayed with them until they could be brought to safety in the morning.

Our lives may seem shipwrecked at times and we feel lonely and afraid, hopeless and wretched.

God has promised that He will never leave us nor forsake us. No matter how desperate our situation, He will stand with us in the storm, in the darkness and in the danger. And He always comes with a heart of compassion, bringing light and hope and the promise of rescue.

So don't lose heart and don't lose hope. He is with you and He will never abandon you.

The soul that on Jesus has leaned for repose,
I will not, I will not desert to his foes;
That soul, though all hell should endeavour to shake,
I'll never, no never, no never forsake.

God's Will, the Only Way

Rejoice always, pray continually, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus.

1 Thessalonians 5:16-18

I was in the holding cell after being sentenced and I was drawn to these verses when my New Testament fell open as I took it out of my pocket. I focused particularly on the phrase, 'for this is God's will for you...'

When the Apostle Paul was in prison, he wrote in one of his letters, 'I know what it is to be in need, and I know what it is to have plenty. I have learned the secret of being content in any and every situation ...'

Paul had realised his need to surrender his life to the will of God. We will never experience true peace, the peace that transcends all understanding, as long as we persist in trying to persuade God to accept our will ... what we want. It can only come from accepting God's will for us.

Although I had been a Christian since my teens, God needed to bring me to my Knees before I finally learnt this lesson. Before I went into court to be sentenced, my wife and I prayed together. We did not pray that I would only get a short custodial sentence, or better still a suspended sentence. Instead we prayed that God's will would be done.

This was my first sentence and I should have been terrified but I no longer felt scared or even condemned. Instead I felt overwhelmingly blessed, thanks to the truly astonishing grace of our sovereign Lord.

Discipline for Good

My son, do not despise the LORD's discipline, and do not resent his rebuke, because the LORD disciplines those he loves, as a father the son he delights in.

Proverbs 3:11-12

We are told not to despise the Lord's discipline and not to resent his rebuke. I like the New Living Translation which says that we should not reject the Lord's discipline and not get upset when he corrects us.

Who does the Lord discipline or correct? It is those whom He loves, just as a father corrects a child out of love. When I first read this scripture the keyword for me was 'corrects'.

In America, prisons are called 'correctional facilities', so logic was telling me that I am in prison to be corrected and this scripture reminded me that I am not alone for my Heavenly Father is with me. I must trust Him as He teaches me.

Discipline means to teach and train. It is often viewed as negative as disciplinarians are not generally motivated by love. But God is the source of all love. He does not punish us because He enjoys inflicting pain but because He is deeply concerned about our development. He knows that in order to become morally strong and good we must learn the difference between right and wrong. That is why He disciplines us.

This scripture has helped me to realise that being in prison is but a 'blip' in God's plan for me. Understanding that has given me the strength and need to keep going, keep my faith, keep my head down and concentrate on my release and on rebuilding my life so that I can live to please God.

I begin each day by reading this psalm and I also pray it during the night if I am unable to sleep.

To him who is able to keep you from stumbling and to present you before his glorious presence without fault and with great joy ...

Jude 24

This wonderful verse comes right at the end of Jude's letter. It is part of his final blessing.

To fall or stumble suggests failure and damage. And the damage can be physical or spiritual. When we fall, it is very helpful to have someone to pick us up and help us on our way.

But Jude's letter is not talking about having fallen already. It speaks of Him who is able to keep you from stumbling: to keep you safe and to protect you when you are in danger and likely to fall.

Picture a family outing when everyone is clambering over low rocks beside a river.

The five-year-old is apprehensive at times and so she reaches for Grandma's hand. Her dad has been keeping a watchful eye on her and tells her: 'Sweetheart, don't hold on to Grandma. because if Grandma slips and falls, so will you. You need to hold onto the rock because the rock won't move.'

The Bible often describes God as a dependable Rock that does not move. Hold on to the Rock.

Our Saviour is able to keep you from stumbling. And, what is more, He will present you before His glorious presence, without

fault and with great joy.

How wonderful is that? Hold on to the Rock.

The Carpenter

'Where did this man get these things?' they asked.

'What's this wisdom that has been given him?

What are these remarkable miracles he is performing?

Isn't this the carpenter?...'

Mark 6:2b-3a

Like most Jewish boys of His time, Jesus learnt His trade from His father. He would have grown up as 'Jesus the Carpenter'. But He was an enigma.

He was not a doctor but He healed the sick and raised the dead.

He was not a fisherman but He could tell experienced fishermen where to lower their nets for a miraculous haul of fish.

He was not a Pharisee but those who heard His teaching were amazed at His wisdom.

He was not a shepherd and yet

He called Himself the Good Shepherd who would lay down His life for the sheep.

He was all those things and more!

But He was still thought of as 'the Carpenter'.

Later, it was Peter who really understood who Jesus was: You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God.¹

Sadly, the crowds, although they followed Jesus around, did not follow Him in their hearts and were easily persuaded to demand His death. It is as if He always remained just 'the Carpenter', never their healer, their teacher and their Good Shepherd.

And so, Jesus carries His wooden cross to the place where it will carry Him, and they mock Him as He dies. He says in His agony: Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing.²

Jesus' life was given, not taken.
And the people are unaware that

here is the Lord of Heaven, laying down His life for all who will receive Him as Saviour. It was why He came.

If Jesus is your Saviour, take a moment to thank God once again for revealing to you who Jesus really is, as He did to Peter. If you think of Jesus as no more than a good man, even just a carpenter, it will be good to read pages 36-39.

Filled with Compassion

But while he was still a long way off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion for him; he ran to his son, threw his arms round him and kissed him.

Luke 15:20b

You will immediately recognise these words of Jesus – from what is probably the most well-known of all His parables.¹ The words describe the father's response when he spotted his 'prodigal' son in the distance, trudging, shamefully, home.

By demanding his share of the inheritance while his father was still alive, the younger son would have caused his father immense pain. He placed more value on his father's estate than on their relationship.

And so Jesus would have astounded His listeners when He

explained that the father was full of compassion, not anger and hatred; that he was actually looking out for his son, longing for him to return; and that he could not get to him quickly enough to welcome him back without any need to grovel.

In our society, hundreds of thousands of families are torn apart, and remain apart, because of anger and hatred and a refusal to show compassion to the person who has committed the wrong.

Perhaps you are grieving over a broken relationship within your

family, either as a son or daughter or as a parent. If so, is there anything which you can do to help to restore the relationship? Are you continuing to pray for God to intervene? Of course, Jesus told the parable to give a picture of God, who is full of compassion towards those who have walked away from Him. He is longing for them to come back.

A Challenge

There are almost certainly 'prodigals' in your prison now. Do you know of anyone whom you can encourage to take that journey back to Father God to enjoy His 'welcome home'?

be blameless and spotless for when the Lord comes.

Life may be pretty tough for you just now and perhaps you are fearful of what lies ahead. But whatever our circumstances and whatever our future on this earth may hold, we can be excited by the future beyond it — the new heaven and the new earth, where righteousness will dwell. Are you keeping that in view? Do not allow your present troubles to cause you to lose sight of that glorious future when we will be with Christ forever.

So, as you wait for that day to come, make every effort to live to please God and you will be at peace with Him. If you are struggling with habitual sins,

confess them to God and ask for His help to overcome them. Perhaps there is another Christian who will also pray for you.

A Harvest of Righteousness

My son, do not make light of the Lord's discipline, and do not lose heart when he rebukes you, because the Lord disciplines the one he loves, and he chastens everyone he accepts as his son.

Hebrews 12:5b-6

At first glance, this is not a very encouraging verse. Discipline and punishment are difficult for us to deal with, and imprisonment shows us just how harsh society's punishment can be. Verse 11 of the chapter tells us:

No discipline seems pleasant at the time, but painful...

As children we really did not like being 'told off' by parents or teachers for breaking rules or causing trouble. And we still find it hard to accept rebuke. Many children, if they are often in trouble, harden themselves against authority and become defiant.

So why do these Bible verses teach us that God's discipline is a good thing that we should neither dismiss lightly or become crushed by?

Firstly, it is because His discipline comes from a Father's heart of love for His wayward child. His discipline is designed to teach us and train us to become righteous: to become like Jesus. His training will lead us along a path that will bless us and bless others. Without it, we would lose our way and damage ourselves and others. Secondly, it is designed to make us grow. Verse 11 continues:

... Later on, however, it (the Father's discipline) produces a harvest of righteousness and peace for those who have been trained by it.

Our heavenly Father's discipline is rather like a gardener pruning a rose. It is designed to make His children flourish. He is a good, good Father. And you are His treasured and much loved child. Allow Him to teach you. It is safe to submit.

The Concealed Revealed

Come, see a man who told me everything I've ever done.

John 4:39

The media are constantly looking to reveal what people in the public eye – celebrities, politicians, business leaders – want to conceal. Shame is often the reason for not wanting the private to become public.

The words quoted above are those of 'the woman at the well', speaking of Jesus. He had shocked her by revealing that He knew what she wanted kept hidden.

Jesus deals with her very gently, a Samaritan who would not expect a Jew to engage with anyone from Samaria, let alone a woman. By making reference to her husband, Jesus opens up the one topic which she would almost certainly have wanted to remain closed. Doubtless her five marriages and her current adulterous relationship caused her much shame: she would have been uncomfortable speaking about her private life.

But Jesus was concerned for her. He had offered her 'living water,' which would become in her 'a spring of water welling up to eternal life' (verse 13). And He wanted to deal with her shame.

How foolish it is to pretend that we can keep something from the

Lord. If there is anything you have chosen not to confess, why not confess it to Him now? You will not be revealing anything that He does not already know and you will be assured that He has forgiven you – that your shame has been dealt with.

What a great promise this is:

If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness.¹

Jesus invites you to do this today.

I heard the voice of Jesus say,

"Behold, I freely give

The living water; thirsty one,

Stoop down and drink, and live."

I came to Jesus, and I drank

Of that life-giving stream;

My thirst was quenched, my soul revived,

And now I live in him.

Many people in prison cannot contemplate a personal relationship with God. They believe that their past has determined their future. They conclude that, if there is a God and if He rewards the good and punishes the bad, then there is nothing they can do to escape His punishment.

Even if they acknowledge that God is merciful, they refuse to accept that His mercy could possibly extend to them. They know that they do not deserve it. And that is true. That is the very nature of mercy – we do not deserve it. And certainly no one deserves God's mercy.

But all who think like this need to read Paul's testimony. God had mercy upon him even while he was a blasphemer and was actively persecuting Christians. He (Saul, as he was then known) had given approval to the execution of Stephen and he set out to fulfil his mission to destroy the church. He had believers thrown into prison.¹ He was, in his own words, the worst of sinners.

Pray for all in your prison who need to know that they are not beyond God's mercy, whatever their crime and despite what others might say. That 'some crimes are unforgiveable' is Satan's lie. Pray that the Lord will reveal His truth to them, as He did to Saul and as He has to countless millions since: Christ came into the world to save sinners, including the worst of sinners.

O teach me what it meaneth,

We must never underestimate the power and the cunning of the evil one who, like the lion, is a predator. Those most vulnerable are those who are not alert to the danger, or even refuse to accept that he presents any danger. So do not be fooled: take Peter's warning very seriously.

But we can take encouragement from his warning. We will not fall prey to our enemy if we remain alert, resist him and stand firm in the faith. And we can do that by staying close to the One who is our Good Shepherd, through prayer and through reading, studying and following His Word.

We must also stay close to the other sheep of His flock, who are our brothers and sisters in Christ. It is when we wander off on our own and isolate ourselves from the shepherd and the other sheep that we leave ourselves

most vulnerable to being devoured by the devil.

Do you need to flee from that danger yourself? Or are there

other believers in the prison whom you need to warn today of the danger they are facing?

God's Power in Weak People

... My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness.

2 Corinthians 12:9

God spoke these words to the Apostle Paul at a time when he was most conscious of his physical weakness.

In the gospels we read of the poor widow who threw her last two remaining coins into the temple offering.¹ She was the one that Jesus drew attention to and is remembered to this day, not because of how much she gave but because she gave all she had.

When 5,000 men and their families needed feeding, Jesus' disciples suggested that the people should be sent away. But there was a young boy, holding

out his lunch and Jesus used that to feed the multitude.2

Gideon is hiding from the enemy in a winepress, afraid, weak, and unimportant. The Lord tells him:

Go in the strength you have and save Israel out of Midian's hand. Am I not sending you?3

Full of doubt and fear, he finally went and routed the enemy hordes with just 300 of his men.

Do you see the pattern here? The world says we need wealth, power and influence if we are going to achieve anything. But those things can be the biggest hindrances to the work of God.

The Apostle Paul, the widow, the child and the reluctant Gideon achieved great things, despite their weakness, because God took their offering and added His glory. God's strength shows up best in weak people.

Like Gideon, we are called to go in the strength that we have. It may not be much, but add our poor strength to the mighty hand of God and who knows what could happen? The enemy is routed, needs are met, souls are saved.

I am trusting Thee for power; Thine can never fail. Words which Thou Thyself shalt give me Must prevail.



Everlasting Love

For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord.

There are times when we all feel unloved and unlovable. Human love comes and goes. Human love is often fickle or selfish and only lasts as long as there is some pay back. And sometimes it is our own actions or attitudes that have driven love away.

The pain of unrequited love, or love grown cold; or a love lost; or love betrayed is heart-breaking. But God's love is not like human love. The love of God is everlasting and nothing can separate us from it. Absolutely nothing.

The Apostle Paul was writing to Roman believers who were persecuted, hated and imprisoned for their faith. But the hatred of the world can never drive away the love that God has for His people. His love is steadfast and His love is certain.

In the book of Jeremiah, God says to His people:

I have loved you with an everlasting love.¹

This is a love that has no beginning and no ending. If you

are in Christ, then even your failure has not separated you

from His love, and neither can anything else.

Loved with everlasting love, Led by grace, that Love to know. Spirit, breathing from above, Thou hast taught me it is so. Oh this full and perfect peace From His presence, all divine, In a love that cannot cease I am His and He is mine.

Forgiveness Has a Price

In him we have redemption through his blood, the forgiveness of sins, in accordance with the riches of God's grace that he lavished on us.

Ephesians 1:7-8a

Paul reminded the believers in Ephesus that it is through Jesus Christ that we have forgiveness for our sins. We know that, of course, but the reminder is appropriate. We must take care when talking about God's forgiveness being free. It was extraordinarily costly.

It is easy to fall into the trap of speaking only of God's love and mercy and His longing to forgive us. It is an appealing message to those who are deeply aware of their need of God's forgiveness – and there are many in prison who are.

But the Cross must always be central to the message of forgiveness. There was a price to be paid – and what a price! We cannot possibly imagine the pain both Father and Son endured as Jesus suffered such a brutal death and carried upon Himself the guilt of us all.

That was the price that had to be paid for the atonement of our sins and it was only Jesus, the sinless Son of God, who was able

to pay the price. It is by His blood that we are forgiven.

And we must remember, too, that God's forgiveness has to be received and we can only receive it once we have repented. Peter made this clear:

Repent, then, and turn to God, so that your sins may be wiped out \dots ¹

For nothing good have I Whereby Thy grace to claim; I'll wash my garments white In the blood of Calv'ry's Lamb.

Sin had left a crimson stain,
He washed it white as snow.

A Brother by **Faith not Birth**

He (Jesus) replied to him, 'Who is my mother, and who are my brothers?' Pointing to his disciples, he said, 'Here are my mother and my brothers. For whoever does the will of my Father in heaven is my brother and sister and mother.'

Matthew 12:48-50

Jesus was constantly shocking people by what He said. But then we should expect Him to say the unexpected! After all, He is the Son of God.

This was Jesus' response to the news that His mother and brothers had come to visit Him and were waiting outside for Him.

What an immense honour it was for Mary to have been chosen to be the mother of Christ. And her other sons were also privileged to have Jesus as their brother.

Yet Jesus was saying that the greater blessing was to know Christ by faith, not as a family member by birth.

Broken family relationships can be one of the most painful consequences for anyone serving a prison sentence. For some it can even lead to being disowned by their family.

But our standing with Christ, through faith, is secure for eternity. If you have accepted the forgiveness of your sins through Jesus' death on the cross and if you seek to do the Father's will, then Jesus views you as His brother or sister.

The mistakes you may have made do not change that. What a truth to hold on to – Jesus as our brother!

A Prayer

Dear Father God, I find this almost impossible to grasp – that Jesus views Himself as my brother, despite the mess I have made of my life. Thank You, Lord, for showing me the way of salvation and the way into Your family.

Giant Despair

For no matter how many promises God has made, they are 'Yes' in Christ. And so through him the 'Amen' is spoken by us to the glory of God.

2 Corinthians 1:20

John Bunyan was in prison when he wrote *The Pilgrim's Progress*. The whole book is an allegory or picture of what it means to walk the Christian life, from salvation to Glory, and what we are likely to encounter.

As they travel, Christian and his friend, Hopeful, are finding the road difficult and decide to take an easier path through a meadow where they fall asleep.

They are woken by the dreadful Giant Despair who captures them and throws them into his dungeon, locking the door and taking away the key. Giant Despair will consume them later!

Depressed and afraid, Christian wants to end his life, but Hopeful insists that they pray. As they do, Christian hears a voice which speaks of the promises that the Most High King has made: 'I will never leave you. I know those who are mine. I will keep you from falling.'

Suddenly Christian remembers that, right at the beginning of his journey, he was given a key. It is the key of Promise, which he still wears. Christian fits the key into the lock and the door of the dungeon opens. They don't stop running until they are back on the right road.

In prison, you may well have moments when you feel locked in by doubts, feeling as though despair is going to consume you. But you have a key. It unlocks God's promises, and was given to you when you were saved. And you have it still.

God always keeps His promises: they are 'Yes' in Jesus. And when we claim them in Jesus' Name, we are saying 'Amen', and God is glorified. And Giant Despair is defeated.

Anxiety

Do not be anxious about anything but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God which transcends all understanding will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

Philippians 4:6-7

Anxiety and worry are almost always about the future: about things that may happen but have not yet happened. Anxiety robs us of our peace.

These verses are not talking about a blind optimism – as in 'cheer up, it may never happen', but give us practical advice about where to take our concerns and where to leave them.

We take them to our heavenly Father in prayer, speaking to Him and sharing our hearts with Him. And by petition, which is asking for His help. We do this with thanksgiving because we are coming to a Father who loves and cares for us and for the things that we love and care about. Not only that, but He takes hold of whatever we lay at His feet and exchanges our anxiety for His peace.

As the hymn reminds us, we often choose anxiety over peace.

O what peace we often forfeit, O what needless pain we bear, All because we do not carry Everything to God in prayer! The peace He gives is beyond the world's understanding but it guards and protects our thinking and our feelings. And even if the

worst should happen, we can trust Him to take us through and bring us to a place of safety.

With all the trappings of the material world torn away. I have been left with Christ and the realisation that a relationship with Him is the most precious possession of all. I do not focus on what has been lost but on what I have gained and so every day, even here in prison, I rejoice in the Lord.

The Lord is not slow in keeping his promise, as some understand slowness. Instead he is patient with you, not wanting anyone to perish, but everyone to come to repentance.

2 Peter 3:9

It is probably true to say that there are many in society, and certainly many in prison, who privately fear God's judgment: they are resigned to it. And they are resigned to it because of the way they have lived: they cannot accept that God would ever forgive them for the things they have done.

They are wrong. God does not want anyone to perish. No one is beyond His mercy and grace, regardless of their past. There is no limit to God's grace: it is immeasurable, more than sufficient to cover the most evil acts.

But there is only one means of escape from God's judgment: it is by repentance and that can be tough. It demands humility as we acknowledge and confess our sin and as we turn from our rebellious nature and decide to live to please God.

Is there someone in your family or in the prison that you might start praying for, or continue praying for, that they might repent and not perish? You can be sure that God is on your side. He does not want them to perish. So, keep praying.

To God be the glory, great things He has done; So loved He the world that He gave us His Son, Who yielded His life an atonement for sin, And opened the life gate that all may go in.

O perfect redemption, the purchase of blood, To every believer, the promise of God; The vilest offender who truly believes, That moment from Jesus a pardon receives.

Who Am I?

And you also were included in Christ when you heard the message of truth, the gospel of your salvation.

When you believed, you were marked in him with a seal, the promised Holy Spirit, who is a deposit guaranteeing our inheritance until the redemption of those who are God's possession – to the praise of his glory.

Ephesians 1:13-14

There is a Christian song, Who am I? It is probably the title that has caused it to get more than 42 million viewings on YouTube.

Many people struggle with that question. They look to establish their identity on social media and measure their status by the number of followers and 'likes' they are able to command.

Sadly, within our prisons there are those who can only see their identity as lying with their crime. And some feel that their identity is simply their prison number.

For Christians, Jesus Christ is our identity – and nothing can change that. We are marked with a seal, the Holy Spirit, who lives within us and who guarantees the inheritance that belongs to us. That song answers its question as do these verses: 'I am Yours.'

And what caused us to find faith in Christ? Amazingly, it was God who chose us:

...he predestined us for adoption to sonship through Jesus Christ, in accordance with his pleasure and will...¹ Take a moment to reflect on this truth – that God chose to reveal

to you the way of salvation – and pour out your thanks to Him.

I know not why God's wondrous grace
To me He hath made known,
Nor why, unworthy, Christ in love
Redeemed me for His own.

But "I know Whom I have believed, And am persuaded that He is able To keep that which I've committed Unto Him against that day."

Proof of Identity

But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control.

Galatians 5:22-23a

It is not sufficient to be aware of our identity by answering that question, Who Am I? (page 150). We have to offer proof of who we are. In our society today we are regularly required to provide evidence of our identity.

And because identity theft is so prevalent, it is no easy matter to prove your identity if your ID documents are lost or stolen.

A friend of mine has spent more than two years trying to secure new documents.

What evidence do we have in order to show that we belong to Christ – that *He* is our identity?

Some might try to do so by boasting that they read their Bible every day or attend chapel every week. Others might try to impress people with their knowledge of the Bible by constantly quoting from it.

But if we were simply to do that, we would not convince anyone. And God would condemn us, just as He condemned the Jewish religious leaders for their acting. On one occasion He told the Pharisees:

Make a tree good and its fruit will be good, or make a tree bad and its fruit will be bad, for a tree is recognised by its fruit. You brood of vipers, how can you who are evil say anything good? For the mouth speaks what the heart is full of...¹

We will be known by our fruit

and we will be judged by our fruit. The compelling evidence of our identity – that we are Jesus' disciples – is the fruit of the Holy Spirit who lives within everyone who has been born again.

Dear Father God, I confess that I struggle with some of those fruits of the Spirit, especially (... name those which are not always evident in your life). Please help me by Your Holy Spirit to display these characteristics consistently.

Kindness

Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you.

Ephesians 4:32

Kindness and compassion are wonderful qualities. We sometimes come across them unexpectedly and they bless us every time. Even small acts of kindness bless us: maybe a driver stops to let us out of a side road, or a kind word is spoken when we're having a tough day, or a helping hand is offered when we are struggling.

We can understand these qualities better by looking at the opposite of kindness: to be uncaring, unforgiving and hateful. They are all ugly words and they all do harm.

Kindness always does good. And because we know that, we can be kind to bless others. That's what Jesus did throughout His ministry. He healed the sick, He taught the poor, He raised the dead, He fed the hungry: always compassionate, always gracious and always kind.

It didn't stop Jesus from being strong and radical, forthright and direct. He spoke all that His Father gave him to speak. He followed wherever the Holy Spirit led Him. Kindness is not weakness. But unkindness is.

And now, that same Spirit is in us as we follow Him. People often

think they are insulting Christians by calling them 'do-gooders', but goodness naturally flows from the Spirit of Jesus in us. His kindness, His grace, His compassion and His love flow into us through His Spirit and out through us into the weary world.

We are chosen to be Christ's

ambassadors in the world and as Father God transforms us into Jesus' likeness, our lives will speak of Him.

Kindness may be in short supply in your prison. If you dispense it whenever you have an opportunity, it will really be noticed – and appreciated.

He had told them during His Sermon on the Mount that they should expect to be persecuted by suffering insults and false accusations.¹ Now, as He prepares them for His death in just a few days, Jesus is emphatic that persecution is not simply a possibility: it is a certainty.

Later, Paul gave the same message to Timothy – that a life lived for Christ will lead to persecution.² There is strong historical evidence that Paul, with many of the earliest disciples, did endure severe physical suffering before being killed on account of their faith.

For most of us in the UK, persecution will not amount to more than ridicule and insults. How should we respond to it? We should recognise that we are blessed when we suffer for being followers of Jesus, for that is what Jesus has told us. And He also said that we should be glad and rejoice.¹

So if we encounter hatred on account of our faith, we can rejoice. It is because Jesus has chosen us to belong to His Kingdom, not the world. How blessed we are.

Jesus also instructed us to pray for our persecutors.³ We may be mocked but they, unless they repent, will suffer God's wrath. We must pray that they will repent.

A Prayer

Almighty God, I am sorry when I have been too scared to make it known that I am a follower of Jesus. Please help me to speak of Jesus, without worrying about what others might say.

In Jesus' Name. Amen.

The LORD your God is with you, the Mighty Warrior who saves. He will take great delight in you; in his love he will no longer rebuke you, but will rejoice over you with singing.

Once the wedding ceremony was over and the reception tables pushed back, the groom, with three friends as barbershop backing, sang the old Ben E King song, 'Stand by me', to his bride.

It was an incredibly moving moment and not just because of the occasion or even the song itself. It was moving because all the love in his heart for his bride was in the singing of it.

And whether it is a serenade or a lullaby sung to a fretful baby, or a

song of worship sung to our heavenly Father, it is the love that is in the singing of it that makes it so precious.

The first two chapters of Zephaniah's prophecy are all about judgment on Israel's enemies. But in the final chapter we come to these verses about God's own people and, as we are also God's people, we can take them to our own hearts as well.

God rejoices over His people. He is with us; He saves us; He takes

great delight in us; He quietens us with His love.

And perhaps most surprising of all – He rejoices over us with

singing. It is not just the song that makes that so very precious but the love that is in the singing of it.

A Prayer

Father God, I find it difficult to believe that You delight in me. But I know it's true. Please help me to be more worthy of Your love in the future than I have been in the past.

- for those shortly to be released and wishing to establish, or reestablish, contact with a church.

The Persecuted Church

There is not one person in the UK who is serving a sentence for possessing a Bible, for distributing Christian literature or attending a church gathering. We still enjoy religious freedom, despite recent instances of people being prevented from exercising their freedom to preach in public places.

Every year Open Doors¹ produces a World Watch List, which identifies, and ranks, the 50 countries where Christians are at the greatest risk of persecution.

In publishing the 2020 List (based upon the twelve months ending 31st October 2019), Open Doors have reported that:

- 260 million Christians (one in eight of all Christians) live in those top 50 countries,
- the level of persecution has been designated as extreme, or very high, in 45 of the countries,
- 9,500 churches were attacked or closed by the authorities 7,600 more than the previous year,
- 3,000 Christians were killed for their faith. Thankfully that is 1,300 less than the previous period but we can take no comfort from that.

Persecution takes various forms. In some countries, Christians do not have the same rights as other religious groups: they may be denied access to education and many job opportunities. Inevitably this leads to poverty and hardship.

Many also suffer violence from other communities, as well as the police and government agencies. And many are imprisoned – and some tortured – for any breach (or alleged breach) of a law which prohibits or restricts them from practising their faith.

Pray for our Christian brothers and sisters who are suffering or live with the risk of persecution, including those who:


- are mourning the loss of loved ones,
- are in prison and for their families,
- are only able to meet together secretly,
- have converted to Christianity and have been rejected by their families and communities,
- live in constant fear of harassment and abuse,
- risk arrest for distributing Bibles and Christian literature.

Pray that the Lord will sustain them. Pray that, even in their suffering, they will experience the Lord's peace and will be able to rejoice in their salvation.

And pray for their persecutors, that they, like the Apostle Paul, will have an encounter with Jesus and will turn to follow Him.

We know that the Lord is building His church and we know that it is in those countries where the persecution is greatest that the church is growing more guickly and stronger.

The Race

And let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us, fixing our eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of faith.

Hebrews 12:1b-2a

It was the marathon in the 2004 Olympics and four miles from home, the Brazilian athlete, Vanderlei de Lima, was in the lead and running well. Suddenly a protester from the crowd attacked him. As a result, he was overtaken by two other athletes and completely lost his rhythm and concentration.

However, he was determined to finish and got back in the race. He didn't win, but as soon as he entered the arena, the crowd, who were aware of the incident, rose to their feet and a huge roar went up until he had crossed the finishing line. They cheered and applauded, not because he had won but because he had persevered to the end. He was awarded the bronze medal.

The Christian life is long distance rather than a sprint, and there are many things that will hinder us in our bid to finish well. Whatever it is that has hindered you in your Christian life, don't give up in defeat: get back in the race and press on to Glory.

Vanderlei had his eyes fixed on the finishing line. We fix our eyes on Jesus. He ran the race before us and He shows us how to run

well. Unlike us, He never put a foot wrong and He persevered through insults, injustice, beatings, the Cross and the tomb.

How did He do that? He fixed His eyes on His Father and on the joy to come. Why did He do it? He did it for your sake and mine. So press

on. Do not dwell on the pain that you may be experiencing now but keep your eyes fixed on Jesus. When your race is done, there will be a crowd of witnesses lining the way, cheering you home to a Saviour waiting to welcome you.

May I run the race before me, Strong and brave to face the foe, Looking only unto Jesus As I onward go.

Authentic Believers

This is how we know we are in him: whoever claims to live in him must live as Jesus did.

1 John 2:5b-6

We have to be constantly on the alert to avoid being deceived. We can easily be deceived by counterfeit goods, forged documents, false claims in adverts, fraudulent investment opportunities and other scams. And we also have to contend with fake news.

Jesus, when speaking to His disciples about the future, warned them:

Watch out that no one deceives you ... and many false prophets will appear and deceive many people... ¹ And, of course, the greatest deceiver is Satan who 'masquerades as an angel of light'.

But the warning in this passage is that people can deceive themselves into thinking that they know Jesus. People who say that they know Jesus but fail to do what He commands are called liars. (v4)

Just as an art expert will produce a certificate of authenticity – that a painting is not a fake – so John tells us how we can we be sure that a person's faith is genuine. Living like Jesus did is the proof that a person is an authentic disciple.

That is a big challenge and we might be tempted to dismiss it as being impossible. But we cannot disregard what John has instructed and we must not forget that we have the Holy Spirit living in us. We need to give Him control of our lives.

If we belong to Jesus, our lives should imitate His. That must be our aim each day. We will continue to sin but, despite our failures, others will see that we are genuine believers if we truly seek to live as Jesus did. And we can trust that some will glorify our Father in heaven as a result.³

May the mind of Christ, my Saviour, Live in me from day to day, By his love and pow'r controlling All I do and say.

What's in a Name?

God said to Moses, 'I AM WHO I AM. This is what you are to say to the Israelites: "I AM has sent me to you."

Exodus 3:14

We are known by our names. The Hebrew word for name means 'renown' or reputation. Until God spoke to Moses, no one had been allowed to know the meaning of the Name of God: not Abraham nor Isaac nor Jacob – no one. But now the meaning of His Name is revealed to Moses, standing at the burning bush, where God has appointed him to lead His people out from 400 years of slavery.

God's Name is Yahweh (Jehovah in English) meaning, 'I Am who I Am'. He is the living God. All other gods are man-made or man-imagined.

Why is God telling Moses His
Name now? Moses was raised in
Pharaoh's palace where everyone
worshipped the lifeless,
powerless gods of Egypt. Moses'
task is to lead God's people out
of Egypt and through many
other lands to their own
Promised Land. All along the
way the Israelites will turn from
the living God to the idols
worshipped by other nations.

But Moses their leader had met the living God. He knew His Name; he knew His renown and His power and for 40 years, he faithfully led God's people. Jehovah is the same God that we worship today. We know Him because He has not forsaken us, even though the world has rejected Him to serve gods of their own making. He sent His beloved Son to live amongst us, to die for our waywardness and

live again to bring us back to Himself.

The Lord Jesus is the living Son of the living God: magnificent in holiness, mighty to save. If you know Jesus, you know God and your name is written in heaven.

Not Condemned

Whoever believes in him is not condemned, but whoever does not believe stands condemned already because they have not believed in the name of God's one and only Son.

John 3:18

Therefore, there is now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus.

Romans 8:1

When something is condemned, it usually means that it has reached the end of its purposeful life: it is beyond economical repair and of no value.

I had that experience recently with a boiler. It had functioned perfectly for 12 years but, inevitably, it had deteriorated through wear and tear over that period. I was not surprised when the engineer condemned it as no longer being safe.

Jesus warned that we all stand condemned by God – and will face His judgment. But, with us, the process is different. We do not start out 'in perfect working order' and then decline gradually. We are born with a sinful nature and so, from the very first day, our sin condemns us. But the good news – the incredibly good news – is that, unlike my boiler, we can be restored (or redeemed to use the term the Bible uses).

How? Not by following a course of 'gradual improvement' (rather than deterioration!). That would be utterly impossible: we cannot do anything to rid ourselves of our sin. The only way is to accept

God's solution – Jesus condemned to die in our place. (See page 36)

If you are 'in Christ Jesus', never stop thanking God that you are

no longer condemned. And keep praying for any family members and friends who do not yet believe in Jesus.

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Humility

Moses is one of the great Bible heroes. Born into a slave family and condemned to death in infancy, he was rescued by an Egyptian princess and grew up as a Prince of Egypt.

After he got into a fight and killed a man, he escaped to the desert, where he lived as a shepherd – until God spoke to him and chose him to lead His people out of slavery and into the Promised Land.

Of all the thousands of Israelites, Moses was the only man that God spoke to directly – making him spokesman to Pharaoh in his palace and to the slaves he led out of captivity. Moses was a hero and He had every reason to be proud. But the Bible tells us that he was the most humble person on the earth.¹

Today's world mocks humility and celebrates fame and success. But the famous, and the 'wannabe-famous', need the adulation of the crowds and they will act to please them. And many of us compromise in order to be liked and accepted by others.

But humble people are not weak people: they are the people that God can use. The proud compare themselves to others: the humble know how small they are in relation to the might of God. The humble kneel. And what an example Jesus gave us, kneeling to wash His disciples' feet: He is both humble and dignified.²

Let us do what the Apostle Peter says and humble ourselves. It will please God and that is so much better than all the applause we might get from the world.

Bearing shame and scoffing rude, In my place condemned he stood, Sealed my pardon with his blood: Hallelujah, what a Saviour!



Sing for Joy and **Shout Aloud**

In prison there is plenty of shouting, mostly in anger and frustration.

Paul and Silas had been thrown into a grim, first-century Greek prison.1 They had been badly beaten up, put in chains and had their feet secured in the stocks. Their 'crime' was that they had rescued a slave girl. Her masters, who had been exploiting her for money, had had them both arrested.

So there they were, in jail, in pain and in chains. Then, with all the other prisoners listening in, they start to pray and to sing.

Suddenly, at midnight, there was a mighty earthquake; the foundations of the prison shook; the doors flew open and their chains fell off!

Despite everything, Paul and Silas had not stopped worshipping God. They understood that even though terrible things can happen to God's people, nothing can ever diminish God's power or Glory.

When we face difficulty or distress, often our first reaction is to complain and grumble and get angry. We are unlikely to sing for joy.

But, God is still God. He is still glorious. He is still worthy of our praise. And it is in worship and prayer that our souls find release from the darkness and rise to heaven – despite everything.

And your joy could have a lifechanging impact on others – just as it did for the jailer in charge of Paul and Silas. So sing for joy to the Rock of your salvation. It will not cause your prison to shake, but something in your spirit will begin to soar as your heart begins to sing.

Praise the Rock of our salvation! Praise the mighty God above! Come before His sacred presence With a grateful song of love.

Hallelujah! Hallelujah! He is God, and He alone. Wake the song of adoration – Come with joy before His throne!

The Repentant Are Welcomed

By faith the prostitute Rahab, because she welcomed the spies, was not killed with those who were disobedient.

Hebrews 11:31

Chapter 11 of Hebrews is well known for being the home of the 'hall of fame' or, rather, the 'hall of faith'. It lists many of the heroes of faith from the Old Testament: Noah, Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Joseph and Moses, amongst others. No surprises there.

But who would have expected Rahab? Not only is she the only woman but she is the only person whose means of making a living gets a mention: she was a prostitute.

Julie¹ (HMP Low Newton) writes:

Rahab may have been a hooker but she believed in God and she

exercised faith. She risked her life to hide the Israelites who had come to Jericho to spy out the land.

I am sure that there are a lot of women in prison who can identify with Rahab. And there are many of us – men and women – living with things such as addictions. They may be self-inflicted or just a way of coping with our lives but it doesn't mean that we have to continue in this way.

We can all find God. Having Him in our lives surely makes a difference. God will always forgive us no matter what we have done.

Think how Jesus treated the marginalised and the outcasts of society. He never avoided them. He was full of compassion for them. His message of repentance was for sinners, not for the righteous.²

On one occasion the religious leaders brought before Jesus a woman who was guilty of adultery. They wanted to stone her, according to the Law of Moses. Although Jesus refused to condemn her, He told her to give up her life of sin.³

God is willing to forgive us whatever we have done but there are two conditions. We must *believe* that Jesus has paid the penalty for our sin and we must *repent*, which means that we must not continue in our sin.

O for the wonderful love he has promised,

Like Grasshoppers

Isaiah 40:15, 22

With so much turmoil and conflict in the world and with powerful leaders seeking to influence the affairs of other nations as well as controlling their own, Satan would love us to think that God has lost control of the world He created. He would want us to believe that God is powerless to intervene.

Isaiah wrote his prophecy at a time when Israel was fearful of the more powerful nations, Assyria, Egypt and Babylon. Isaiah reminded the people that it was a matter of perspective.

Yes, Israel was small in comparison but, to the Lord, nations are like a drop in a bucket.

God sits above the earth (which elsewhere is described as His footstool¹) and stretches out the heavens as though they were a curtain.

And how does God view the 7.8 billion of us who inhabit the earth? Isaiah tells us that we are like grasshoppers. To God, all our feverish activity, even the planning and scheming of the leaders of the world's

superpowers, are likened to the cheerful chirping and hopping of grasshoppers. But we are all very precious and dearly loved 'grasshoppers'!

So, remember: when we call to Almighty God, we are addressing the One who truly does have

absolute power and authority over all that He has created. And what an amazing privilege it is that we have access to Him. Do not entertain any thoughts from Satan that God is powerless to act. One day He will demonstrate His awesome power for all to see.

Almighty God, help me never to despair at the lawlessness and wickedness in this world. Please fill me with Your peace, knowing that You are sovereign and that all power and authority is in Your hands.

Only Branches

A new born baby clings to its mother. It is the natural thing to do. It is the only thing the baby can do. But, as it grows, it becomes less dependent upon its mother and takes steps - very tiny and faltering steps initially to explore the world. Eventually the young child should become an independent adult.

But the Christian life is different. Christians do not mature by growing apart from Jesus, the One through whom they were born spiritually. Jesus' instruction is very clear: we must remain in Him. The word 'remain' occurs eleven

times in this chapter and forty times in the whole of John's Gospel.

Jesus likens us to a branch of a vine. We can only produce fruit so long as we remain attached to Him: He is the Vine. Separated from Him we can do nothing.

The crucial question is how do we remain (or 'abide', which is the word used in earlier versions of the Bible) in the Vine? We abide in the Vine when we trust and obey Him and look to Him alone for all that we need. We must allow Him to satisfy our every need.

And for that to happen, we must allow God's Word to take root in our hearts and we must love it and live by it. As we do that, we

will be following the instruction which Paul gave to the believers in Philippi – to have the same mindset as Christ.1

I need thee every hour, Most gracious Lord; No tender voice like thine Can peace afford.

I need thee every hour, In joy or pain; Come quickly, and abide, Or life is vain.

I need thee every hour; Teach me thy will, And thy rich promises In me fulfill.

The Victory

But thanks be to God! He gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.

A favourite story in the Bible is the story of David defeating Goliath.¹

The Philistines and Israelites are camped on either side of the valley. The 9 ft tall giant Goliath, fully armed and armoured, emerges from the camp to challenge the Israelites to send a champion to fight against him: one on one! Whoever loses will condemn his whole army to defeat and slavery.

His challenge, twice a day for forty days, brings no response. But then David, the young shepherd boy, visits the Israelites. He is angry at Goliath's insult to the Name of God. He volunteers to confront Goliath and fells him with a single sling-shot.

The Israelite army hails David as their hero but the victory that he wins is theirs too. Even though only David had the courage to fight Goliath, all the soldiers still claim the victory as their own.

This is a great illustration of the victory that Jesus secured for us as He defeated sin and death on our behalf. We contributed nothing to secure that defeat, but His victory was for us and is therefore ours as well as His.

Jesus will never be defeated. That is why we can stand firm when we come under attack and why we can keep going in His service, even when we don't seem to be making any progress.

David confronted Goliath and triumphed for Israel.

Jesus confronted sin and death and defeated both – for us.

Crown him the Lord of life,
Who triumphed o'er the grave,
And rose victorious in the strife
For those he came to save;
His glories now we sing
Who died and rose on high,
Who died eternal life to bring,
And lives that death may die.

Out of **Darkness**

But you are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's special possession, that you may declare the praises of him who called you out of darkness into his wonderful light.

1 Peter 2:9

Prison is often thought of as a dark place because of the evil committed by many who are serving sentences. And some plan to continue that same way of life in the future.

But don't be deceived into thinking that there is light on the outside. That is not true. As the Apostle Paul explained, the world is a dark place, populated by people whose minds have been blinded by the god of this world to keep them from seeing the light of the gospel.1

And in the verse quoted above, the Apostle Peter reminds us that all who follow Jesus, the Light of the World, were themselves in darkness until God, by His mercy and grace, called them into His marvellous light. In Paul's words:

For He (God) rescued us from the dominion of darkness and brought us into the kingdom of the Son he loves,...²

So let us walk as children of light and have nothing to do with the unfruitful works of darkness.3

That may be a real challenge for you on your wing but pray for God's help to enable you to do that. And remember Jesus' instruction to His disciples:

In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven.4

We cannot experience any greater joy than seeing others give glory to God as a result of our witness.

Take time to read the passages from which the verses quoted above have been taken. And if you have access to a concordance, why not look up other passages which speak of darkness and light?
